### Introduction

The 4-H Pet Pals project begins when you start your 4-H project year in October. Some sections of the record book require you to establish some goals to meet. It is important to do that at the start of the project year. If you need help understanding the material, contact your 4-H leader or county Extension agent.

This project is for those who want to learn how to care for their tropical fish, gerbil, hamster, guinea pig, or small reptile; keep their pet(s) healthy and contented; know the costs involved in raising; promote responsible pet ownership; in addition to practice important life skills such as decision-making, communicating with others, leading self and others, planning and organizing, and accepting responsibility.

If you are interested in a "**pet rabbit**," you should enroll in What's Hoppening (Rabbit 1), Making Tracks (Rabbit 2), or All Ears (Rabbit 3) and use the *Pets Record Guide*. If your interests are in "**market rabbits**," you should take one of those three projects and use the *Market Livestock Record Guide*. If you breed and raise rabbits, you should take one of those three projects and use the *Breeding Livestock Record Guide* and supplemental breeding rabbit doe and buck record sheets.

This record guide is designed to be used with the Pet project. It is suggested that each project be used for three years before moving to the next level. After your first year in the Pet project, you will need to reorder only the *Pets Record Guide* until you move to the next level.

### **Project Guidelines**

- Complete at least seven main chapter activities or More Challenges activities in the Pets Achievement Program each year.
- Finish each level within three years.
- Complete 21 activities before advancing to the next level.
- If you choose to do More Challenges activities, record in a notebook or portfolio the what, when, where, and how you accomplished each selected activity. Include your notebook or portfolio with your project book for grading.
- Practice and develop life skills as you learn more about pets.
- Participate in at least three learning experiences outlined in the Planning Guide each year.


